All these Lila were happening at the behest of all the gods including Brahma, for the redemption of the world. Eventually, Krishna was also born to Devaki [Sister of Kansa] and her husband Vasudev in the prison Fort of Kansa, the tyrant ruler of Mathura.

Meanwhile, at the same hour, day, month, and the year, Yashoda at the village of Gokul, gave birth to a baby girl, Yoganidra, or Yogamaya. As Yashoda fell asleep due to exhaustion of childbirth, she did not know the gender of her baby.

It was possible only because all the Kansa's guards in the prison and the palace were put to sleep under a spell with rain with thunder. When Basudev reached Gokul, he picked up the

baby girl from Yashoda's side and left his son in her place. Yashoda was also fast asleep due to a spell.

When Yashoda woke up, she took the baby boy as her own son. [The boy got the name of 'Krishna' after Yashoda and Nanda took him to the ashram of Garg Maharishi – Garg ashram. Rohini's son was also named Ram after Lord Ram. As he was strong, Bala was added. So, he came to be known as Balram. Garg Acharya Ashram is on the bank of Jamuna River, near Mathura. Yashoda's husband Nanda was a cousin of Basudev].

As Krishna grew up in Gokul, he enjoyed playing Ras leela [Play of Sweet taste or aesthetic flavour] in Braj Brindaban with Radha, and Gopis of Brindaban. Then, when he reached the age of 11, he was separated from Radha for one hundred years because of the curse by ShreeDam.

Inside the building on the right side, there is a baby cot, swinging it by two Brahmins seated, one on each side, holding a length of rope each. It was meant to be Baby Krishna's cot that was rocked by his mother Yashoda.

Only when the duration of the curse of ShreeDam ended after one hundred years, did Radha and Krishna meet at Prabas Tirtha in Kurukshetra before they returned to Golak [Celestial abode].

ANNOTATION.

[It all began when Krishna was taken to Mathura by Akrura at the age of 11, as ordered by King Kansa of Mathura. Kansa knew the prophecy in Vishnu Puran that he was to be killed by his nephew. So, he sent Akrura, one of his ministers, in a chariot to fetch boys Krishna and Balram.

Krishna never returned to Gokul/Brindaban. In Mathura he slew Kansa and released his biological parents from Kansa's prison. He stayed in Mathura until he was 28 years of age, when he moved to Dwarka, where he married 16,108 wives. There, he lived for 96 years and 8 months, until he was 125 years old. He died 36 years after the Mahabharat war].

Krishna, however, continued to exist in Gokul/Brindaban in the minds of all the people in Braj. They remembered and talked about how Krishna had killed many demons, such as Daityas and Danaos, to give them salvation.

Since Krishna left Brindaban, there was nothing but chaos in it. All life came to a standstill. Young gopas stopped tending cows, with tearful eyes. The cows had stopped feeding grass and the calves did not suckle their mothers anymore. There was wanton devastation and general lethargy all over Brindaban.
